Where do I fit in?

As an adult leader, you may be involved in a range of tasks which may be general in nature or aligned specifically to your skill set. As an adult leader, you will be required to attend the event for the full duration. Your role will be closely aligned to supporting Scouts within Unit life, ensuring wellbeing of the Scouts in your care.

During the application process, you will have the opportunity to nominate any specific skills or experience. These will be considered when allocating roles for the event.

What could the role involve?

My Key Responsibilities	The Key Activities I May Perform
Supporting Camp Activities	 Work alongside Camp Leaders and other staff members, collaborating to provide an enriching experience for the Scouts. Work within Unit campsites to ensure the wellbeing of Scouts Collaborate with other Unit Leaders to ensure Scouts are actively engaged in the program. Working with a youth Unit Leader and Patrol Leaders to ensure the youth program is functioning
Safety & Supervision	 Responsible for helping to maintain a safe camp environment by supervising activities, being prepared for first aid responses, and adhering to camp protocols. Serve as positive role model and mentor to Scouts, providing guidance and support to help them grow and develop skills
Working with Others	 Be collaborative and innovative in working with others. Demonstrate the Scout Promise and Law, and abide by the code of Conduct and Code of Ethics.





What skills & qualifications do I need for this role?

- Be registered as an adult member of Scouts Australia for the duration of the camp.
- Have completed the WHS and Child Safe Scouting e-Learning modules.
- Hold a Working With Vulnerable People (WWVP) card or Australian state/territory equivalent for the duration of the camp.

Essential

- Be capable of handling the physical and emotional requirements of the event.
- Complete a GG's Camp registration.
- Have Australian Government recognised photo identification at the camp.
- Strong commitment to the Purpose and Mission of Scouting
- Good communication and interpersonal skills

Desirable

- Prepared to adapt quickly.
- Deep knowledge and understanding of the Scouts Australia youth program.
- Experience in other major events or significant Scouting projects will be highly regarded.

- Comfortable being challenged and responding to challenges.
- Passionate about youth leading, adults supporting.
- Consistently demonstrate behaviours and attitudes consistent with the Scout Promise & Law.
