

EXECUTIVE REPORTS

Chief Commissioner of Australia

It is a pleasure to be able to write this, my first report as Chief Commissioner. Scouts Australia continues to offer a contemporary and adventurous developmental program for young people across Australia and has placed girls front and centre – normalising their participation in our program.

Scouts Australia wants to go further, ensuring that we are a modern and relevant organisation for all members of the community. We are committed to a diverse and inclusive movement and will continue to work hard to ensure that Scouting in Australia reflects the demographic of our Nation.

50 Years of Girls and Women in Australian Scouting

Fifty years of girls and women in Scouting in Australia is a milestone to be proud of and 2024 marks this anniversary.

The contributions of adult volunteers are essential in ensuring that Scouts Australia remains a viable organisation to support the development of young people. While there are many women who volunteer with Scouts Australia, the gender balance in senior leadership roles – particularly the board – is skewed heavily toward men. Diversity in leadership contributes to organisational resilience, and it also ensures that young people are being mentored by a range of leaders who reflect the diversity of the community.

Our actions:

- Scouts Australia has set a target for our senior leadership to reflect our membership: 40% women. This will be reported annually to the board.
- Scouts Australia is reviewing the process and communications we use to encourage nominations for Life Membership and other honours (e.g., Order of Australia).
- Scouts Australia's board will consider how it can align with the National Strategy to achieve Gender Equality, when published.

Developing leaders

Scouting is, at its core, about developing leadership potential. However, there is more we can do to build the pipeline of women, especially young women, into leadership roles. There are opportunities both in terms of Scouts' own members, as well as seeking opportunities to offer leadership training to other women in the community through the Scouts Australia Institute of Training (which offers certificates and diplomas in outdoor skills, business, leadership, creative arts, volunteer management and project management).

Our actions:

- Scouts Australia is seeking funding to bring Scouts' adult leadership and management training (Cert IVs and Diplomas) to women re-entering the workforce. This will be reported annually to the board.
- Scouts Australia plans to use its social media channels to highlight female leaders in the organisation.

Improving participation

Research has shown adolescent girls drop out of organised sport and recreation at a rate higher than their male counterparts. With nearly 50% of new participants being girls, Scouts Australia is working hard to show that adventure and leadership is for everyone.

We believe that you can't be what you can't see, so throughout our movement there are women and girls leading Scouting, not least in uniform at the National level. I am proud to work alongside some of our best including Ezgi Bridger, Deputy Chief Commissioner of Australia, Lisa Picking our International Commissioner, Julia Miller who is our newly appointed National Commissioner Adult Training and Development after her role as Acting National Commissioner Youth Program, Jean Clifford – Child Safety Commissioner and Shaylah McClymont - National Rover Council Chair. These women are inspiring leaders who set an example to our girls and other aspiring leaders.

New Zealand Jamboree

In late December 2023, 687 Australian Scouts participated in the 23rd Aotearoa New Zealand Jamboree, held in Hamilton. The event offered a wide range of activities that fostered personal growth, resilience, and international friendships. Additionally, 248 members enjoyed a post-tour to Rotorua, enhancing their experience through adventure and cultural exploration. Similarly, 52 Australian Rovers attended the 81st Aotearoa New Zealand Moot over Easter, in March 2024, engaging in a variety of activities and building strong connections with their New Zealand counterparts, followed by an adventurous post-tour in Rotorua.

Parliamentary Friends of Scouting

The first Parliamentary Friends of Scouting group met in March in the Senate Courtyard. The event was jointly sponsored by MPs Louise Miller-Frost and Jenny Ware. The event was the very first of two annual gatherings



which will be held in Federal Parliament each year. Embracing the spirit of Scouting, youth members from all sections attended the event to share their Scouting stories and "scarf up" Federal Parliamentarians.

GG's Camp 2024

Joey Scouts, Cub Scouts, Scouts, Venturers and Rovers all camped on the Governor-General's front lawn for a week, experiencing the thrill of a lifetime at GG's Camp 2024. Held at the magnificent Government House, nestled in the heart of Canberra, GG's Camp 2024 saw our youth from every State and Territory share Scouting with our Chief Scout over 5 days filled with fun, friendship and adventure. It was an action-packed program where adventure knew no bounds. From high ropes courses to canoeing on picturesque lakes, the opportunities for adrenaline-pumping activities were endless. Our youth immersed themselves in team-building activities to forge lifelong friendships with fellow Scouts from all over the country. With the added bonus of exploring the rich history and culture of Government House, this camp created unforgettable memories.

The GG's Camp 2024 was the first major National event fully aligned to the new program. Activities were based around Challenge Areas, Outdoor Adventure Skills and Special Interest Areas. Participates, Assists and Leads were built into the program with youth members each having the opportunity to Plan> Do> Review> their experience and showcase the benefit of the Scouts Australia Program in action.

The team delivering the event did a wonderful job ably led by Jon Willis OAM. A huge thank you to all involved including a very special mention to ACT Branch.

The Program

Our program is still relatively new and we know there are still some areas for us to focus on and improve. We are not going to shy away from this. The new National Strategic Plan lists as Key Move Priority One that we will make the delivery of our program easier and impactful, and this work continues in earnest. As part of implementing our plan, we will give our people the tools, clarity and confidence to deliver life-changing, adventurous and safe experiences for young people. Teams are being established to undertake this work and we extend an invitation to all our members to participate in this work. New and improved resources have already been developed to support the program,

including enhancements to Scouts | Terrain and the piloting of Character Courses to provide greater leadership development opportunities for young people. We are committed to reviewing the program which will include the chance for all of our members to have input. Together we can continue to enhance the program, its delivery and ultimately the positive experience that our youth members receive from participating in Scouting.

Royal Patronage

Buckingham Palace advised Scouts Australia that following a thorough analysis of over one thousand organisations, His Majesty, King Charles III, confirmed his delight to accept the Patronage of The Scout Association of Australia. This confirmed for us that the peak award for the Venturer Scout section would indeed be named The King's Scout Award. Buckingham Palace confirmed that His Majesty's patronage would commence from the first anniversary of Their Majesties' Coronation. Peak awards have been backdated to May 2024 and reissued as King's Scout Awards with redesigned award certificates now available.

Roverway

The 7th Roverway in Norway, held from July to August 2024, saw 94 Australian Rovers join over 5,500 participants from around the world, engaging in cultural exchanges and community-building activities.

43rd World Scout Conference

In August, Australia had a strong virtual presence at the 43rd World Scout Conference in Cairo, where our delegation contributed to critical discussions shaping the future of Scouting. The team, led by International Commissioner Lisa Picking, actively participated in decision-making that will guide global Scouting efforts for the next three years. Australia's role in these international events highlighted the importance of global collaboration and the enduring spirit of Scouting.

Scouts Aotearoa (New Zealand)

Our closest Scouting neighbours have always been our good friends, with our youth members flocking in large numbers to one another's major events. At a National level, we are strengthening these ties by working more collaboratively. The Chief Commissioners of both National Scout Organisations now meet quarterly with a commitment to include our senior leadership



in our major National workshop meetings. Sharing information, experiences and knowledge will assist both organisations to grow and benefit from our shared experiences. We look forward to continuing to work together so that more young people across Australia and New Zealand can benefit from all Scouting offers.

Asia Pacific Region

Scouts Australia continues to be an active, contributing member of the Asia Pacific Scout Region (APR). Elston Hynd, Deputy Chief Commissioner is on the Region Committee. He has also been appointed to the APR Safe-from-Harm panel to assist in reviewing NSO standards and identify areas for improvement. This is critical work to ensure young people remain safe when participating in Scouting activities both here in Australia and when they travel abroad. Elston is tireless, contributing so much to our own organisation as well as to others throughout the Asia Pacific.

The APR is home to the largest number of Scouts in the world. Of the Movement's more than 57 million members, over 35 million young people and approximately 220,000 adult volunteers are registered in the APR. As a branch of the World Organization of the Scout Movement, it fosters the Scout Movement in the region and supports 30 National Scout Organizations. Every three years the APR holds an APR Summit prior to the World Scout Conference. This year the summit was held in Bangkok, Thailand. A small delegation attended on behalf of Scouts Australia where the work required for the World Conference was undertaken. The Summit agenda also included workshops and plenary sessions for the delivery of Scouting across our Region.

Adult Recognition

Our volunteers contribute millions of hours each year across local communities throughout Australia. Recognising their collective and individual efforts is so important and should be simple. The Adult Recognition Award process has been streamlined and simplified so that we (all of us) can recognise more of our volunteers. I urge every adult member to take the time to write a nomination for just one volunteer this coming year. Together we can ensure we thank those who contribute to the fabric of this great organisation.

Bronze Wolf Awardee

The Bronze Wolf Award is World Scouting's highest honour. It recognises the outstanding service, commitment, and contributions of volunteers to the Scout Movement and is the only award presented by the World Scout Committee. Since its establishment, fewer than 400 people have received the award.

The most recent awardee is Peter Blatch OAM.

Peter Blatch was elected to the World Scout Committee at the 40th World Scout Conference in Slovenia in 2014 for the Triennium 2014-2017. He was subsequently re-elected to the World Scout Committee at the 41st World Scout Conference in Baku, Azerbaijan in 2017, and served faithfully for the 2017-2020 Triennium and an additional year (2021) due to the COVID19 pandemic preventing the conduct of the 2020 World Scout Conference in Egypt.

Scouts Australia recognises the outstanding service and contribution of Peter Blatch to Australia, Asia Pacific and World Scouting and congratulates him on the award of the Bronze Wolf.

Support for Scouting

We are grateful to all who support our local Scout Groups. It would be remiss not to mention Bunnings. From sausage sizzles, offering discounts on products through to sponsoring equipment and materials for local Groups, Bunnings has contributed over \$1.9m to Scouts Australia's Groups, across more than 2,059 activities this year. Over the next year, all of our Groups and formations will be able to receive a Bunnings PowerPass Card providing special pricing to Scouting.

Parliament Friendship Group

Thank you

After a year in the role, I am so grateful to the National Team who welcomed me and who have provided so much support. Elston Hynd and Ezgi Bridger, the Deputy Chief Commissioners have been a constant source of this support. During this past year I took a period of leave to walk 1600km on the Camino. During this time Ezgi was Acting Chief Commissioner, doing a fantastic job. We are truly fortunate to have leaders in our organisation like Elston and Ezgi. Their term of office is coming to an end in line with our policy. Two new Deputy Chief Commissioners will join the team bringing new energy and ideas soon but before this happens, an enormous thank you must go to both Elston and Ezgi for their hard work, dedication and commitment.

Nigel Reece finished up as the National Commissioner Youth Program during the past year. Nigel ushered in the then new program providing leadership, advice, direction and support for all Branches as they embarked on the journey of One Program. Thank you, Nigel, for all of your work at a National level.



EXECUTIVE REPORTS

Chair, National Executive Committee

Scouting is the values-driven youth leadership program for Australia, in the community and the outdoors. This year Scouts Australia adopted a new strategic plan from 2023-2026.

This plan has five "key moves" that will help us focus our efforts on the most important challenges. Over the next three years, we will:

- make delivering our youth program easier and more impactful
- build the recruitment and retention machine to grow our movement
- reshape a contemporary volunteer model that drives Scouting
- unlock and steer resources to future proof our mission
- transform the organisational support of our movement

In addition to a new strategic plan, we also have two new faces at the head of our organisation. Brendan Watson commenced his term as Chief Commissioner of Australia in November 2023, succeeding Phil Harrison after his six years in the role. And Chris Allen joined us in the role of National General Manager in May 2024. As our executive leaders, Brendan and Chris are essential to implementing our strategic priorities. We are all glad to have them both on board!

This year has been sobering in terms of our key success metric: how many people are participating in our youth program across the country? Last year I was proud to report 4% growth in membership in the year to July 2023. However, this year, we saw a 5.8% decline over the year to May 2024. This pendulum swing of membership is of significant concern to the National Executive Committee (NEC), and we are working to understand and respond to it.

On a more positive note, it has been an excellent year for major national events. In April 2024 we held a once-in-a-lifetime camp on the grounds of Government House, Canberra. Over 2,000 Scouts were hosted by the Governor General for a week of camping and adventure. And currently, Scouts across the country are gearing up for the 26th Australian Jamboree in Maryborough, Queensland, our flagship event as a national association.

Financially, Scouts Australia has posted a satisfactory result for the year ended 31 March 2024. We ran at an operational deficit of \$391,985. This was offset by better-than-usual income from our investment portfolio as markets improved, after a difficult 2022 and start of 2023, leading to a net surplus for Scouts Australia of \$2.9 million.

As an organisation, we celebrated 50 years of girls in Scouting and published a plan to continue to improve diversity in our organisation. We have also continued to work on our systems of governance and management. This has included a national focus on compliance with mandatory training – reducing the number of noncompliant leaders by 83% across the country.

Of course, it is all in the service of a program that is adventurous, fun, challenging, and inclusive. Those scouts that attend the Jamboree in January 2025 will learn new skills, make new friends, and have the adventure of a lifetime. But indeed, we can say the same thing for all our members – Scouts is a global movement, grounded in communities. And thanks to leaders and groups all around the country, we can be proud that we are helping young people become resilient, thoughtful and dynamic members of their community.

EXECUTIVE REPORTS

National General Manager

I'm delighted to be able to provide this report, my first as National General Manager of Scouts Australia.

In the brief period since my appointment in May 2024, I've learned so much already about Scouting, but the standout for me has been the unequivocal commitment and belief in the movement that I see in so many people I've met along the way - volunteers and professional staff. It's a great privilege to see this commitment, energy and enthusiasm being directed into the vast array of activities we undertake, and I'm thrilled to have this opportunity to make a contribution.

I would like to thank my predecessor, Mark Stedfut, for the contribution he made as National General Manager and I'd also like to take this opportunity to acknowledge and thank our Deputy General Manager, Neil Carey, who stepped into the role ahead of my appointment. Neil took on the lion's share of additional work for a number of extremely busy months and did a thoroughly excellent job, which he has continued in supporting me since May.

Many will not be aware of the wide range of tasks undertaken by our National Support Team, the NST. Despite the diversity of their responsibilities and the workload that is managed day-to-day, the NST is actually a small team of just a dozen people. I have been incredibly impressed by the dedication displayed by each and every member of the team and their unwavering drive to provide support to Scouts Australia. They have all provided incredible support to me personally and so I will take this opportunity to thank them: Annette Dynska, Tim Kluger, Marina Avelar, Jeffrey Lehrer, Emma Watson, Rita Ciradi, Estelle Marine, Tracy Pullan, Sarah Eldridge and Kitty Tsang.

Obviously, the work continues and evolves, and we have undertaken a number significant reviews during the period between May and August.

The key areas brought to my attention at the commencement of my appointment were the need to review our technology platforms, financial management structure and processes, and the need to review the NST to determine whether current responsibilities remain aligned with the organisation's needs, current and future.

To address these priorities, I engaged two external specialist consultancies to respectively review our financial management processes and the roles and responsibilities of the NST. Within these reviews I arranged for key members of the volunteer leadership team to be directly engaged by the consultants to ensure the widest possible consultation. Both of these reviews have now been completed and I will be working with the

consultants, the National Support Team and members of the National Executive Committee to consider next steps.

With regard to technology platforms, there is significant work to be done, and we will be undertaking a wideranging consultation process to identify our most urgent priorities. On the basis of that consultation, we will develop a Digital Roadmap and implement strategies to commence work on fixing what needs to be fixed.

Importantly, we cannot do any of this work in isolation. Our collaboration and cooperation across the country will be critical to the ongoing success, relevance and reputation of Scouting in Australia. In achieving that success, I must acknowledge the outstanding work of the Executive Officers and professional staff in every Branch of Scouts across the country. Already we have all committed to working closely together and have reestablished the National Executive Officers Network to provide a framework for collaboration. There are many challenges facing us all at present and we will be working together to find solutions that will be of benefit to everyone and, ultimately, ensure the ongoing delivery of Scouting to young people by those who have voluntarily undertaken that responsibility at the frontline.

To that end, I have adopted the Scouts PURPOSE as the basis of my approach to my duties and those of the National Office – National Support Team, because it's important to keep in mind why we're here, why we exist and why we do what we do:

The Purpose of the Scout Movement is to contribute to the education of young people in achieving their full physical, intellectual, emotional, social and spiritual potentials as individuals, as responsible citizens and as members.

Finally, I must pass on my sincere thanks to our NEC Chair, Toby Phillips, our Chief Commissioner, Brendan Watson OAM, and every member of the National Executive Committee and National Team for the incredible welcome and support I have received since my appointment. I could not be more grateful.

Phil and Josh have a huge amount of large event experience, building and leading successful teams and planning exciting and memorable experiences for all attendees.





43rd World Scout Conference - Cairo, Egypt (Hybrid)

From 17 – 23 August, the 43rd World Scout Conference took place in Cairo, Egypt, gathering representatives from 170 National Scout Organizations (NSOs) across the globe. This event, organised by the World Organization of the Scout Movement (WOSM), is an event run every three years, where key decisions shaping the future of Scouting are made. Australia's presence at this year's conference had a delegation operating in a hybrid capacity from Perth, Western Australia. The delegation was led by Lisa Picking, International Commissioner of Australia, who served as the Head of Delegation. She was joined by Brendan Watson, Chief Commissioner of Australia, Ezgi Bridger, Deputy Chief Commissioner of Australia, Shaylah McClymont, National Rover Council Chair, and Lincoln Rieger, National Youth Ambassador, Together, they represented Australia's interests and contributed to the critical discussions that will guide the Scouting movement for the next three years.

Throughout the six-day conference, the delegation engaged in a series of tasks, including voting on the new World Scout Committee for the 2024-2027 term, deciding the locations for future world events, and reviewing the new strategy for Scouting and the triennial plan. These decisions will directly impact the direction and focus of Scouting worldwide.

The Australian delegation, operating out of the Scouts WA Head Office, managed the challenges of participating in a hybrid format, ensuring that Australia's voice was effectively heard in the global arena. Their participation highlighted Australia's active role in global Scouting and

the importance of collaboration and forward-thinking in ensuring the continued success and relevance of the Scouting movement. We thank Chief Commissioner Ayden Mackenzie JP, Executive Manager Dougal Mayor and all staff at Scouts WA for their hospitality over the week and also the staff and volunteers from WOSM for putting on such a great conference.

25th World Scout Jamboree: Report of the independent Review Panel

In September 2023, the World Scout Committee appointed an independent Review Panel to conduct a thorough review of the events associated with the 25th World Scout Jamboree in Korea and to provide a comprehensive report highlighting learnings and recommendations. This panel was Co-Chaired by Phil Harrison, Immediate Past Chief Commissioner of Scouts Australia.

The Panel's report presents a factual examination and analysis of the existing governance frameworks for hosting the Jamboree and takes into consideration the historical management of Jamborees which relied heavily on trust with the Host.

The report offers recommendations for actionable steps that the World Organization of the Scout Movement and future Hosts should take to enhance and improve the quality and safety of World Scout Youth Events.

Thank you to Phil and his fellow panel members for undertaking this work to ensure we live our program and recommit to continuous improvement.





Asia Pacific Region Leaders Forum – Bangkok, Thailand

In April, the National Scout Organization of Thailand (NSOT) hosted the 11th Asia-Pacific Regional (APR) Scout Leaders Summit (referred to as the Summit).

The Summit is gathering key leaders from the member National Scouts Organisations and National Scout Associations from all over the Region to report and review the progress of the APR Plan 2022-2025.

More than a celebration of successes and milestones, APR also invited key people from the World Scout Committee to further foster cooperation among members of the Scout Movement and discuss developments in World Scouting.

23rd Aotearoa / New Zealand Jamboree 2023-24

However, the Camp that concluded on April 19 surpassed all expectations with just on 2,000 Joey Scouts, Cub Scouts, Scouts, Venturers and Rovers, Leaders and Adult Supporters from every State and Territory enjoying an extraordinary week of activities, fellowship and personal development.

Another huge bonus was a week of wonderful weather, making the idyllic location and wide range of activities - including sailing and kayaking on Lake Burley Griffin, trips in a tethered hot air balloon rising above Government House at dawn, campfire MasterChef cooking, visits to the War Memorial, abseiling at the Scouts ACT Camp Cottermouth, contributing to a breathtaking indigenous artwork designed especially for the camp, four- wheel driving in the Brindabella hills, Questacon visit, environment focused activities and so many more - just that much more special.

A highlight was the night time entertainment, centred around a stage constructed on the Government House vista lawn, where His Excellency warmly welcomed the Scouts to his home during the Opening Ceremony but also where, the following night, Her Excellency Mrs Linda Hurley shone at the Campfire performing a song she wrote to celebrate the camp – enjoyed so much that she was asked to reprise it before she left the Campfire, mobbed and celebrated like a rockstar!

At the Closing Ceremony we were privileged to witness the Chief Commissioner of Australia, Brendan Watson, surprise Mrs Hurley with the award of the Silver Emu for Distinguished Service to the Scout Association. His Excellency was similarly surprised with the award of the Silver Kangaroo – the highest Scouts Australia award for adults - in recognition of his Eminent Achievement and Meritorious Service. These awards are richly deserved for the many years in their roles as Chief Scout of NSW, then Chief Scout of Australia and as leaders in their local group many years prior.

A camp of this scale, with the challenges of a site with no infrastructure to speak of to support camping and running activities, does not happen without a huge amount of work by the organising team and the support of the local Branch. I want to thank all the team from ACT Branch – from the Chief Commissioner, through all the ACT leaders and professional staff who supported this camp which was the largest scout event ever held in the ACT – and the Contingent Leaders, and particularly recognise the extra support offered by Victoria to overcome capacity challenges in several areas. Over the last twelve months, young people across Australia have been leading and learning through a fun, adventurous, challenging and inclusive Scouting youth program.

The focus of our Youth Program Team nationally is on designing and supporting a high-quality program that is relevant to young people, grounded in the best nonformal education practices and realises our purpose as a movement. Many projects have been in action across the last year to enhance the delivery and support of our program.

Throughout 2023-2024, the Australian Scouting Youth Events Policy, Standards and supporting material have been developed, approved and released. These will provide guidance and parameters in the planning, delivery and review of events. The National Youth Program Team have been working with members of their teams to explore and test these tools and we are excited for the growth and potential adventures for young people that will be enabled by this new framework.

Scouts | Terrain has continued to evolve over the last twelve months. Improvements have included:

- the ability to delete draft programs,
- a decrease in compulsory fields,
- the addition of 'no Challenge Area' as an option to support the inclusion of more activities in the program,
- ability to review the programs attached to Milestones for our adult leaders,
- introduction of the view for leaders not attached to a Group, and
- the addition of the 'award' function in the approvals area.

Usage of Scouts | Terrain continues to grow, with the focus over the last twelve months having been on increasing the effectiveness and functionality for leaders and support teams.

Character Courses have been rolled out with piloting occurring in some locations across the country. These meet the requirements of the Leadership and Personal Development component for the sectional peak awards and provide members with an opportunity to explore their own views and leadership experiences alongside like-age peers. These courses also link into some of the more recent World Scouting initiatives that have been, and are being, released.

Youth Program, Training and SAIT combined to produce pathways for youth members to be recognised in the Adventurous Activities areas through their program achievements. This work was built on the Outdoor Adventure Skills linkages with formal recognition pathways through VET.

The Diversity and Inclusion Team released a series of resources to support neurodiversity in Scouting. With an increase in diagnoses revealing a greater prevalence in the broader community, these tools have been compiled to assist leaders in supporting the transition and inclusion of members into their programs and activities. This team has also commenced the process to create a Reconciliation Action Plan for Scouts Australia, which will continue to evolve over the coming months.

Our Performing Arts shows across the country have continued to thrive. Hundreds of members take to the stage each year, supported by equally as many members backstage and front of house. Members have been seeking recognition through program and vocational pathways, supported through Milestones, Special Interest Areas and the Creative Industries Vocational packages.

Work has commenced on Key Move 1, with an initial plan developed by the National Youth Program Team and working groups being established to enable the development and implementation. We look forward to this work accelerating over the next twelve months.





It is an exciting time in Scouting, with many changes and initiatives anticipated from a range of areas.

There have been a number of personnel changes over the last twelve months.

We would like to thank Nigel Reece for his work and contributions as the National Commissioner Youth Program over the last six years. Nigel's passion for building a culture and framework of belonging, respect and safety culminated in the YOUth Safeguarding statements and resources released in September 2023, which forms the start of this reporting period.

Julia Miller concluded her tenure as Deputy National Commissioner Youth Program. Julia's contributions in representing Youth Program at the National table continued whilst she held the role of Acting National Commissioner Youth Program throughout the majority of the 2024 calendar year. The Youth Program Team thank her for her commitment to the Youth Program and congratulate her on her next adventure as the National Commissioner Adult Training and Development.

Equally, we would like to acknowledge the contributions of Felicity McNeice, Daniel Bartlett, Niamh Hitchman and Diana Swift who have each been part of the Youth Program portfolio throughout part of this last twelve months and have taken on roles that have seen them leave our regular meeting and collaboration network.

We welcomed Nick Molnar into the role of Deputy National Commissioner Youth Program. Nick has taken on the challenge to spearhead Key Move 1 from the Strategic Plan as well – a project to make delivering our program easier and more impactful. Nick has brought a fresh face to the table, with a new energy and enthusiasm for ensuring the Scouting youth program meets the needs of our members.

Lachie Page, Morris Orchard and Shaylah McClymont have joined the portfolio as representatives from their Branches, bringing different insights and perspectives for discussion and consideration.

ROVER SCOUTS REPORT

It has been another successful year for the Rover Scout Section. Rover Scouts have been active in their local areas including running activities and events for Rover Scouts as well as for other Sections. Rover Scouts have been active in national events and taking great advantage of the international offering of Scouts Australia.

The Rover Section continued its strong commitment to serving the community. The National Rover Council (NRC) delivered the National Rover Blood Drive supporting Australian Red Cross Lifeblood and donated to environmental charity Bush Heritage to carbon offset the annual NRC Conference.

The Rover Section undertook a review into retention in the Rover Scout Section. The Project Patrol surveyed 165 Venturer Scouts, Rover Scouts and Adult Leaders from across the country and made recommendations on how to improve retention in the Section. The NRC continued to deliver the Rover Challenge grants again this year, providing funding to Rover Scouts and Rover Scout Units to challenge themselves. The NRC supported challenges such as Wilderness First Aid training, cross country skiing expeditions, abseiling equipment to enable vertical activities and hiking expeditions to K'gari.

SCOUTS AUSTRALIA INSTITUTE OF TRAINING (SAIT)

In the thirtieth year of Scouts Australia having a Registered Training Organisation (RTO number 5443), the Scouts Australia Institute of Training (SAIT) has had another positive year recognising the learning of youth and adult members with Qualifications and Statements of Attainment.

The RTO continues to offer to both youth members and all adults in Scouts Australia meaningful opportunities to have their Scouting experiences, training and other learning recognised with nationally recognised, industry developed qualification.

Many members complete the vocational education and training outcomes available from SAIT so that they can take on other roles in their support of Scouting. Examples of this include part and full qualifications in:

- Outdoor Leadership to support the delivery of the outdoor adventure skill component of the youth program.
- Training units of competency to support adult training.
- Assessment units of competency to support assessment of qualifications via SAIT.
- Working in a Child Safe Environment Skill Set, to support our obligations and approach to ensure that Scouting is a safe environment for young people.

Additionally, all Scouts Australia members over the age of 14, have the opportunity to use their experience gain recognition of prior learning and achieve full qualifications or micro-credentials that they can use in further education or their career. Qualifications available are from the following fields:

- Volunteering For youth and adult volunteers
- Workplace Skills and Business Mostly youth formalising their Scouting skills
- Leadership and Management Typically adults formalising their experience
- Creative Industries Relating strongly to, but not dependant on GangShow
- Project Management Leading contingents and other significant projects
- Outdoor Leadership Participation in and leading outdoor adventures

Venturer Scouts actively participating in the youth program have opportunities to complete Certificate II and Certificate III qualifications.

Adults in Scouts Australia contribute in a multitude of ways and there are a wide range of qualifications typically within the Certificate III to Advanced Diploma levels that meet the experiences of section leaders, group leaders, committee members, GangShow directors, adventurous activity guides and international contingent leaders.

Rover Scouts have all of the opportunities of youth and adult members to use their experiences to complete qualifications from Certificate II to Advanced Diploma.

Members of Scouts Australia can access the SAIT benefits at no cost and yet calculated on the premise, if members were charged by another RTO to attain the same qualifications, the financial value SAIT provides annually has consistently been over \$4 million. This is a very substantial and useful benefit to being a member of Scouts Australia, whether a youth member or an adult.

SAIT volunteers over the last thirty years have contributed to what will be 40,000 certificates before the end of 2024.






Value Per Branch

We will use this plan to drive our efforts and our investments while also mobilising our wider community of support to ensure a vibrant and impactful Scouting movement in Australia.

LORD BADEN-POWELL SOCIETY

OUR PURPOSE: The Purpose of the Lord Baden-Powell Society (The Society) is to raise funds for the development and education of Australian Youth in their Community and Internationally.

The Lord Baden-Powell Society was set up by Mr Geoff Lee in 1984, and we have this year entered its milestone of 40 years since its inception.

Financial Donors of the Lord Baden-Powell Society have helped young Australians experience the benefits and joy of Scouting by providing financial support to Scouts across Australia.

With AJ2025 coming up, this year in particular, we increased our fundraising efforts for the 26th Australian Jamboree (AJ2025) taking place in Queensland in January 2025.

So far, we have raised a total of \$135,579.74 to 30th August 2024. Our goal still stands at reaching \$150K by the end of the year.

The Lord Baden-Powell Society allocated \$120K for the distribution of funds to State Branches to help support families for AJ2025 this year.

Further highlighting the unwavering support of the LBPS, we generously contributed \$36,000 in support of the Governor General's Camp which took place on the grounds of Government House in Canberra in April.

Along with further funding, and the prospect of new Members joining, we will continue to support our present and future Youth Members.

Memberships

The Society has 4 levels of membership – Members, Leaders, Ambassadors and Patrons who contribute from \$195 to \$1,200 annually. Alongside these membership donations, we also receive, donations to our Jamboree Fund.

The Society's Honours Recognition Program, which was first launched in 2011, and we are proud to announce that it is still ongoing and updated regularly whenever Donor donations reach the financial contributions targets.

The program recognises those members, both current and past, whose cumulative financial contributions total in excess of \$15,000, including membership gifts, jamboree fund support, general donations, and bequests to the Lord Baden-Powell Society.



A new electronic version of the Honours Board is located on our website under the Honours Recognition Program page for everyone to see. Once a Donor Member name is added onto our honour board, the name will never be removed.
